The ACT's high elevation (at 600 metres) means we're hit by extreme winter chills as well as those summer scorchers.

And sometimes we can get all seasons in a single day. The ACT enjoys a dry climate with four distinct seasons.

Summers can be scorching, frequently hitting the 40s, yet our winter embraces frequent frosts and fog.

Our climate – along with our proximity to the Great Dividing Range and other national parks – makes the ACT an ideal outdoors adventure destination. For example, Namadgi National Park's forests, rivers and waterholes comprise 40% of the ACT, making it the perfect place for bushwalking. And with the Australian Alps not far away, skiing and snowboarding opportunities are rife in winter!

FUN FACT



Canberra can get pretty chilly! Its lowest recorded minimum temperature was -10°C in July 1971. Brrr!



THE FUTURE OF ACT PROPERTIES



Australian properties are as popular as ever, but with a growing population and greater demand for homeownership, Aussie blocks are getting smaller. We spoke to the experts to hear what they've got to say.

Property expert and **Professionals Ultimate** Director Peter Taliangis says the days for huge blocks and big backyards are gone. "The average family home is currently being built on 450-500 m²," he says.

"There's generally enough room for 20 m² of grass, or maybe a fraction more if a two-story home is built. That means pools and tennis courts are slowly making way for an al fresco area and a strip of garden bed."

Todd Schulberg from

Homely.com.au says this trend towards smaller blocks means people have to rethink how to make their backyards work better for them:

"People are living on smaller blocks and starting to adapt their idea of a dream home to be something a little more versatile and unique ... In the future, an Aussie backyard is more likely to be a balcony with a railing or a very small outdoor area."



And what about the ACT?

It's been a slow couple of years in the ACT but the market's beginning to improve, says Chief Minister Andrew Barr. Domain reports: "Mr Barr said the city had displayed a strong resilience over the past few years, especially in the housing market, where prices had been steady following an appropriate flow of land release and urban infill providing new housing."

Your Investment Property says high wages keep ACT properties affordable. In fact, it's the most affordable state or territory in Australia. It says Macquarie, Chisholm and Harrison are all suburbs to watch. Their proximity to quality infrastructure, including transport, schools and parks, makes them popular Canberran suburbs.



IMPROVING PROPERTY VALUE

"Adding value to your home should be about adding value where you can use it most, not where you can see it most. People are more attracted to liveability rather than image. On top of that, people don't want to pay top dollar for someone else's personal touch and style; they want to buy something neutral that they can make their own and then add their own value. Keep things simple, clean and remember to not over-clutter."

STYLE CURATOR creator Gina Ciancio has been a Canberra resident for the past eight years. She's really making the most of her "own little oasis" in the outdoors. Here's what she has to say about backyard landscaping in the ACT:

In Australia, we're so lucky to have the opportunity to make our backyard an outdoor living room that can be used for most of the year. To me the best thing about backyards is that they are our own little oasis - whether it's a large outdoor space or just a little balcony, it becomes a space we can make our own.

In Canberra there's a move towards organic, home-grown produce so people aren't just using their backyards for entertaining or relaxing. And the creative ways people are converting sections of their backyard into vegetable gardens is impressive – corrugated iron or wood pallet raised planter boxes, and wall-mounted herb gardens are just some of the clever ideas I've seen.

In terms of backyard 'trends', I'm seeing people use more commercial materials like gabion walls and steel structures. Accent lighting, like LED up lights, are also becoming more popular and can transform the average backyard into one that is dynamic.

I'm currently building a new home and am excited to finally create an outdoor space that will be stylish, usable and suited to our lifestyle. Our old house, which we demolished to make way for the new home, was unmanageable. We're looking forward to creating an outdoor space that will be planned, with defined 'zones', and low maintenance.

Canberra is pretty unique among Aussie capital cities in that it turns into a ghost town come any grand public holiday. Being close to so much natural beauty, every long weekend heralds a mass exodus, with locals heading off for some outdoors adventure.

With the snowfields and the coast just a short drive away, we've really got the best of the best. And with so many national parks and alpine rivers nearby, it's hard to stay in town when nature entices.

Easter is the big one; with four days off, Canberrans take to the national parks or the coast for a spot of camping, bushwalking, or beach sports. Head to Tidbinbilla or Namadgi National Park for some bushwalking, or take a trip to Jervis Bay for its pristine beaches. When the season arrives, hit up the ski slopes at Brindabella.

There are times it's worthwhile sticking around town. Australia Day is naturally big in the nation's capital; you can join the crowd on the lawns of Parliament House on Australia Day eve to hear the announcements of the Australians of the Year.

The Anzac Day Dawn Service is another important event in the ACT calendar. Join the contemplative silence of a thousands-strong crowd as the sun rises over the Australian War Memorial.

Aside from the big holidays, Canberra has some more subtle festive occasions. In spring, Canberra hosts Australia's biggest flower festival, Floriade.


