Crowded House summed it up when they crooned about Melbourne's four seasons in one day. Victoria has a mild and generally comfortable climate all year round. But in the capital, it can be drizzling in the morning, gloriously sunny by noon, and then blustery at night. You can be wearing shorts and winter jackets in the same day.

No matter the weather, Victorians champion the outdoors lifestyle. Summertime calls for visits to the beach and outdoor barbeques (pending fire restrictions). In autumn and spring nature's colours change to rich vibrant hews in country towns and parks, inviting picnics and hiking. Winter means sitting under a heat lamp in one of the cafés or bars that define our capital's café culture.

#### **FUN FACT**



Victoria is the wettest state in mainland Australia BUT Melbourne receives 50% less rain than Brisbane or Sydney!

Be sure to pack a brolly if you're planning on visiting!







With a city as popular as Melbourne, we've stopped looking at the far reaches of the city. Instead we're starting to eye those bigger inner city blocks and create more subdivisions.

With a growing population and greater demand for homeownership, Aussie blocks are getting smaller. In fact, **Professionals Ultimate** Director Peter Taliangis says the days for huge blocks and big backyards are gone.

"The average family home is currently being built on 450-500 m<sup>2</sup>," he says.

"There's generally enough room for 20 m<sup>2</sup> of grass, or maybe a fraction more if a two-story home is built. That means pools and tennis courts are slowly making way for an al fresco area and a strip of garden bed."

Victorian Todd Schulberg from Homely.com.au says this trend towards smaller blocks means people have to rethink how to make their backyards work better for them:

"People are living on smaller blocks and starting to adapt their idea of a dream home to be something a little more versatile and unique ... In the future, an Aussie backyard is more likely to be a balcony with a railing or a very small outdoor area."

#### And what about Victoria?

"The blue chip suburbs of Malvern, Armadale and Toorak continue to deliver strong results while Melbourne's western suburbs have also sky-rocketed, with people looking to get in at all costs".

With the rise in house prices, inner-city homes are becoming more untenable to those entering the market. "We're seeing fringe suburbs start to pick up and gain traction, as people are priced out of areas they were hoping for," Todd says.

An exception is Sunshine and Sunshine West, which are still affordable alternatives to the eastern suburbs, yet only 10km from the CBD. But you still want to get in quick: neighbourhood prices have risen around 20% in a year.



#### IMPROVING PROPERTY VALUE

"Adding value to your home should be about adding value where you car use it most, not where you can see it most. People are more attracted to liveability rather than image. On top of that, people don't want to pay top dollar for someone else's personal touch and style; they want to buy something neutral that they can make their own and then add their own value. Keep things simple, clean and remember to not over-clutter."

"I live in a property in outer north-east Melbourne, where we are lucky to be perched high surrounded by native bush land to enjoy a rural aspect and stunning sweeping views.



We're footy-mad here in Victoria, which is why the AFL Grand Final has to be one of the most anticipated events of the year.

Walk around Melbourne on 'that Saturday in September' and you'll find the streets spookily deserted. The locals pack into our backyards and pubs throughout the city to watch Australia's biggest sporting event.

As Checks and Spots creator and Melbourne local, Clare Hillier, says: "It doesn't get much bigger than Grand Final Day."

If you really want to get into the spirit of things, your celebrations will actually begin on the day before the Big Event, joining the hordes in Melbourne's CBD to watch the Grand Final parade. In fact, we love our Grand Final so much that the eve of that famous Saturday is now a state public holiday.

On the day itself, a hush descends on the state as Victorians retreat into their homes. Averaging a television audience of about 3 million viewers across the country, Grand Final Day is spent outdoors in the fresh spring air with family and friends, and the television volume cranked loudly.

"Grand Final Day means a backyard barbeque with friends," Clare says.

"It is as much about hanging out and having a good time, as it is about the footy."

To be fair, this is just one of the many sporting events

Victorians gather round to watch. The Boxing Day test cricket is another.

But more important perhaps is Melbourne Cup Day, a sporting event so highly esteemed that Victorians enjoy a public holiday to watch the big horse race.

#### How do we celebrate Melbourne Cup Day?

You guessed it – with a barbeque in the backyard with close friends and family. But this is a BBQ with a twist. Guests must attend in their Sunday Best, dressed in formal wear fit for the races. And everyone has to partake in the pot luck tipping.

Here's how Belinda Vandenboom, of the interiors and lifestyle blog Gallerie B, enjoys the day:

"Some of my best memories of Cup Day are spending it with friends in a marquee at the racetrack. It is a great chance for the ladies to get dressed up – although the weather can often be unpredictable!
