Perth enjoys a Mediterranean climate with warm and sunny days and a short, mild winter. The sea breeze – called the Fremantle Doctor – brings relief from the heat in summer. It's simply perfect for the outdoor lifestyle.

As the second biggest state in the world, Western Australia boasts dry but fertile lands in the south, desert in the east, and tropics in the north (where the seasons are split into wet and dry). In fact, WA's southwest claims more biodiversity per square kilometre than the entire UK. So what are you waiting for? Get out there and explore!

THE FUTURE OF WA PROPERTIES

Australian properties are as popular as ever, but with a growing population and greater demand for homeownership, Aussie blocks are getting smaller.

In fact, West Australian property expert Peter Taliangis, Director of **Professionals Ultimate**, says the days for huge blocks and big backyards are gone.

"The average family home is currently being built on 450-500 m²," he says.

"There's generally enough room for 20 m² of grass, or maybe a fraction more if a two-story home is built. That means pools and tennis courts are slowly making way for an al fresco area and a strip of garden bed." Todd Schulberg from Homely.com.au says this trend towards smaller blocks means people have to rethink how to make their backyards work better for them:

"People are living on smaller blocks and starting to adapt their idea of a dream home to be something a little more versatile and unique ... In the future, an Aussie backyard is more likely to be a balcony with a railing or a very small outdoor area."

And what about Western Australia?

Peter predicts a few property trends to look out for in WA, including a rise in one bedroom apartments and environmentally-friendly homes. Meanwhile, Todd tells us to keep an eye on Canningvale.

"This suburb provides good value and is an affordable entry point with many other suburbs very established and hard to crack," he says.

IMPROVING PROPERTY VALUE


"Adding value to your home should be about adding value where you can use it most, not where you can see it most. People are more attracted to liveability rather than image. On top of that, people don't want to pay top dollar for someone else's personal touch and style; they want to buy something neutral that they can make their own and then add their own value. Keep things simple, clean and remember to not over-clutter."

BACKYARD FOR THE WA LANDSCAPE

DESIGN YOUR

In recent years, we've seen a loss of the huge Aussie property with one house and a large garden. With everyone flocking to the coast, there's plenty of extensive coastal expansion, with housing estates creating more condensed properties. As a result, the garden is diminishing, with typically just a small garden front and back – but that means West Australians are really beginning to make the most of what they've got, whether that's a landscaped backyard or an al fresco area complete with outdoor kitchen.



Checks and Spots creator Clare Hillier says more people are looking at sharper landscaping designs.

"We're seeing cleverly-designed backyards that are connected to the home to create an additional living space. More than simply having a visual connection, all the comfort and style of indoors is also being carried through to the outdoors."

Restrictions on backyard space are creating the need for more versatile spaces, as **Interiors Addict** founder Jen Bishop explains:

"In Australia, our weather is so great for so much of the year. We're lucky we get to spill outside ... Maybe because of that, indoor/outdoor living continues to be a growing trend, blending the indoor and outdoor, for both entertaining and everyday life."

These outdoor spaces combine verandahs, bifold doors and outdoor blinds to insulate the area. Add a fire pit or outdoor heater, an outdoor kitchen, and some overhead fans and your outdoor space is complete to use year-round. Artificial grass is also becoming increasingly popular. Once you've whacked down the brick paving and a garden bed, West Australians prefer to pop in some instant-fix, low-maintenance artificial lawn they know is going to stay green and look good all year round.





Finally, make sure you have large comfy indoors-styled furniture to coax you outside. Jen Bishop has a huge deck with a nice lounging space at one end and a big dining space at the other.

"It works for all entertaining situations! If it's just us, we hang out on the lounges, but we have a table for 8 when we have friends or family over for a meal."

AUSTRALIA DAY, THE WA WAY



Who cares about New Year's Eve? We keep the big guns until Australia Day, when we bring out Western Australia's largest annual fireworks display.

Australia Day hits in the peak of summer as a nice finishing note to the school holidays. So in Western Australia, we make it a big deal. That means lots of flag-waving (and wearing!), fireworks, and almost guaranteed glorious weather.

The big celebrations don't really kick off until the evening, but there's plenty to do all day. Most councils host some form of community celebrations.

Western Australians enjoy taking an Esky and a picnic rug into one of the state's many public parks. There are dedicated "BYO zones" at Langley Park and Kings Park from 6.30pm. Langley Park and South Perth host free entertainment zones, which are great for keeping the kids happy until "the big event". You don't want to miss Perth's renowned Australia Day Skywork's display, which kicks off at 8pm and lasts half an hour.

Make sure you get yourself a good vantage point anywhere along the Swan River. Hundreds of thousands will be joining you, so get in early! **The City of Perth Skyworks** website will tell you the best places to head to.

Finally, at 8pm, the sky above Swan River lights up in spectacular fashion. Fireworks launched from bridges, barges and buildings in the CBD will illuminate the sky as you've never seen it before. It's the perfect end to Western Australia's biggest day of festivities.
